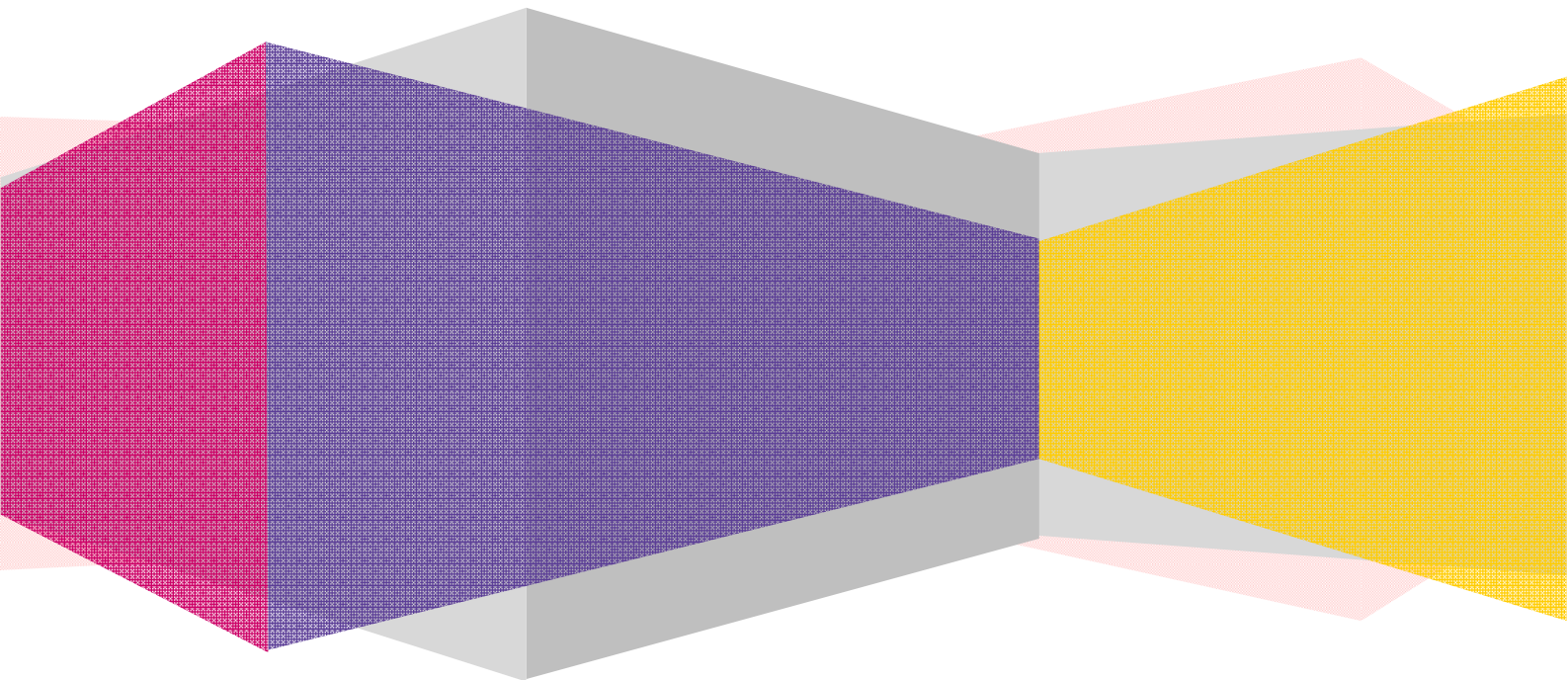

Women's Health Education Foundation or in Indonesia usually called Yayasan Pendidikan Kesehatan Perempuan (YPKP) was established on June 23, 2003 by health professionals and activists who have concern on women's reproductive health issues.

MAIN ACTIVITIES

I. Integrating gender, leadership and reproductive rights into midwifery curriculum

Together with some women NGOs and Indonesian Midwives Association (IBI), YPKP integrated gender issues, women's autonomy, leadership, and reproductive health issues into midwifery curriculum by developing 9 modules:

II. Managing midwifery scholarship for marginalized women

YPKP manage scholarship for marginalized women from remote area with less prosperous family's background and who had a family relationship with traditional birth attendant to continue education to midwifery diploma program at selected health polytechnics (Poltekkes).

Until 2011, YPKP had provided scholarship to 227 women from 17 provinces in Indonesia in 4 batch.

1st batch: 88 scholars who came from 9 provinces (Jakarta, Banten, West Java, East Java, Riau, Jambi, Bengkulu, West Nusa Tenggara, and East Nusa Tenggara).

2nd batch: 2 scholars who came from South Sulawesi (Selayar Island).

3rd batch After tsunami tragedy in 2007, YPKP with Kapal Perempuan established a program to recover welfare of areas that were affected by tsunami to improve their health situation. YPKP supported in managing the midwifery scholarship for women who came from Nanggroe Aceh Darussalam (NAD) and North Sumatera (Nias). 20 scholars came from NAD and 42 scholars came from North Sumatera.

4th batch: 75 scholars who came from 8 provinces (West Sumatera, Bangka Belitung, Bengkulu, West Sulawesi, Central Sulawesi, Gorontalo, South Sulawesi, East Nusa Tenggara).



III. Conducting training for midwifery teachers

Since August 2003, YPKP has cooperated with midwifery diploma program from 4 health polytechnics in Indonesia (Jakarta III, Bandung, Malang, and Jambi) to integrate 9 modules that were developed by YPKP into midwifery curriculum. Training for teachers were conducted to ensure correctness in applying module to student and teaching method. Teachers were expected can provide knowledge and skills to their students so the students would be midwives who were not only competent in clinical matters but also had high gender sensitivity by considering the existing culture.

IV. Providing support for young midwives to improve sexual and reproductive health situation of young people and to encourage male involvement

YPKP assisted young midwives who were YPKP's scholars and conducted several trainings to update and increase their skill and knowledge to increase young people's responsibility and men involvement related to reproductive health and sexuality issues.

The trainings included both clinical and non-clinical training:

- training of midwife as peer educator for young people
- training for maternal and neonatal emergency
- training of peer educator to increase male involvement in women's health
- training of VIA (visual inspection with acetic acid) test.



V. Replication of YPKP's modules

Since 2011, four Health Polytechnic/Poltekkes that became partners YPKP (Poltekkes Jakarta III, Poltekkes Jambi, Poltekkes Bandung and Poltekkes Malang) had implemented YPKP replication program. Each Poltekkes that became partners of YPKP was expected to become an information center by training a minimum of 8-10 other potential midwifery schools. The topic of training depended on the title of YPKP's modules.

In 2014, two other Poltekkes (Poltekkes Makassar & Poltekkes Padang) joined Replication program. Until 2015, the 6 (sixth) Poltekkes had trained more than 360 lecturers from 107 midwifery schools.



VI. Building young midwives leadership in SRHR

Increase the capacity of midwives, especially young midwives, so they are not only able to help the delivery of safe and convenient for women / mothers, but also able to become peer educators and agents of change in the field of SRHR for society, especially women in their community.

YPKP conducted Leadership training in SRHR for young midwives. After the training, each participant was asked to apply knowledge and skills in the form of public education, counseling and advocacy.

In June 2014, she received an Award from IWHC in New York for the work to advance Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights together with Mr. Ban Ki-Moon, the Secretary General of United Nations whom being honored for his deep concern to women's health condition.
